A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

*The light came into the world,
but people preferred darkness to light,
because their works were evil.*

In this line from St. John's Gospel, can we not argue that it was written today? Do not people prefer darkness to light? Are not people's works evil? I know, I am sounding like the pessimist, but as I look around I see that darkness is preferred to light. Everyday the truth is further perverted. What was once known to be evil is now promoted as normal, good, healthy, and an alternative way. Should we not be progressing toward the truth rather than reverting to ancient pagan thought and archaic practices? In ancient times human beings were sacrificed on pyramids, thrown into volcanoes and slain on altars. Today families are starved, people are enslaved, and fetuses, literally young ones, are aborted.

Ever since contraception was permitted by the Lambeth Conference of the Church of England in 1930, sexuality has steadily been divorced from its primary purpose of procreation and thus belittling the unitive meaning of the marital act even among Catholics. Sexuality has become "recreational" and so a means to pleasure. Once separated from its procreative role, sexuality becomes debased – losing its meaning. Thus sexual pleasure can be found between any numbers of beings. Pornography has exploded and people exploited. Rather than protecting women and children, this sexual revolution has used them, abused them, and discarded them as objects rather than treating them as persons created in the image and likeness of God. In Sodom and Gomorrah, the residents treated God's angels in the same way, thus they received their just reward. In Germany, the Church has now approved a liturgical blessing of homosexual couples. This is against the orders of the Pope and contrary to the deposit of faith. Essentially the Church in Germany is in heresy and near schism.

My Brothers and Sisters we need to live in the light. We must despise the works of evil, not excuse them or make them not evil. If we live in the Light, we will see through the darkness. We will accept the Lord Jesus into our hearts who will open us up to the truth and the truth will set us free. Free to be the image of a loving God. Free to see the goodness in the gift of sexuality, to see the sacredness of human life, and to know that *God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.*

HELP FOR OUR VETS

The Knights of Columbus Council 3240 together with The Church of the Assumption is repeating its annual drive for items needed for our Veterans who visit the Lyons or East Orange Facilities for Medical treatments. The Items listed below are **NOT** supplied by the US Government and donations like these are greatly appreciated. Last year our Church collected 19 boxes of needed supplies which lasted months, we hope to duplicate or surpass this amount again this year.

Both Hospitals have **SPECIFIC Guidelines** on what they can **Accept** and what is **NOT Acceptable**.

Acceptable Material Donations needed year-round:

Toiletries, body wash, deodorant, men razors, shaving cream, body lotions, shampoo.

Undergarments men and women- t-shirts, tank tops, socks, sport bras, undergarments, etc. All sizes from S – 4XL.

Season/Weather appropriate clothing for men and women to include pajamas, shirts, pants, shorts, sweatpants, sweatshirts, jackets, coats, hats, and gloves. All sizes S – 5XL.

Slipper socks for men and women. All sizes.

Shoes/sneakers (with and without velcro)- Men sizes 8 – 14, women sizes 7 – 12

Winter boots for men and women- Men sizes 8 – 14, women sizes 7 – 12

Coffee; Keurig K-Cup Coffee and Can Coffee

Snacks commercially and individually packaged; this can include puddings for Veterans who suffer from dysphagia.

St. Toribius Alfonso of Mogrovejo

St. Toribius was Archbishop of Lima. He was born at Mayorga, León, Spain in 1538 and died near Lima Peru on 23 March 1606.

Of noble family and highly educated, he was professor of laws at the University of Salamanca, where his learning and virtue led to his appointment as Grand Inquisitor of Spain by Philip II and, though not of ecclesiastical rank, to his subsequent selection for the Archbishopric of Peru. He received Holy Orders in 1578 and two years later was consecrated bishop. He arrived at Payta, Peru, 600 miles from Lima, on 24 May, 1581. He began his mission work by travelling to Lima on foot, baptizing and teaching the natives. His favorite topic being: "Time is not our own, and we must give a strict account of it." Three times he traversed the eighteen thousand miles of his diocese, generally on foot, defenseless and often alone; exposed to tempests, torrents, deserts, wild beasts, tropical heat, fevers, and savage tribes; baptizing and confirming nearly one half million souls, among them St. Rose of Lima, St. Francis Solano, Blessed Martin of Porres, and Blessed Masias. He built roads, school houses, and chapels innumerable, and many hospitals and convents, and founded the first American seminary at Lima in 1591. He assembled thirteen diocesan synods and three provincial councils.



Years before he died, he predicted the day and hour of his death. At Pacasmayo he contracted fever, but continued laboring to the last, arriving at Sana in a dying condition. Dragging himself to the sanctuary he received the Viaticum, expiring shortly after. He was beatified by Innocent XI in 1697 and canonized by Benedict XIII in 1726. His feast is celebrated on March 23.

MAKE A SANDWICH FOR THE HUNGRY

Lenten sandwich making: looking for something different to do during lent? Why not try making sandwiches for those in need at St. Joseph's social service center in Elizabeth.

Here is how it works: every Thursday evening between 6:30 and 7:00 pm there is a volunteer at the annex (the two garages facing Coolidge Place) collecting sandwiches that will be delivered to St. Joseph's.

Guidelines for sandwiches:

- Meat (2 slices) and Cheese (1 slice), or
- Peanut Butter and Jelly
- No mayo, condiments, lettuce, or tomato, please
- Sandwiches must be individually wrapped in plastic sandwich bags (no aluminum foil) and inserted back in the bread bag.

One loaf of bread typically is enough for 10 sandwiches. You must mark the outside of the bread bag with the type of sandwich and the date that it was made. (example: PBJ 2/15 or ham & cheese 2/22)
