A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

**Next Sunday is
Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord.
To accommodate the length of the Mass,
the 12:00 Noon Mass will be at 12:30 PM.**

“And Jesus began to weep.” With this one short sentence, these few simple words, the evangelist recounts the great mystery that God loves us. He is with us in our pain and suffering. He is not a God far away and distant who watches idly by as we go through life, but he is intimately united to us. When He became man, he took on not only a bodily appearance, but also our human, fragile, and loving heart. He feels for us, his heart breaks for us, and it is this great compassion that brought him to us so that we might live forever.

His friend Lazarus got sick and died. His friends Mary and Martha mourned over their brother’s death. And Jesus, who called them his friends, raised Lazarus from the dead. And he ordered the others to untie him, symbolic of the sins that bind us and condemn us to death. So it is Jesus, the resurrection and the life, who frees us from the sins that would condemn us to death, and raises us up to new life. This happens sacramentally at baptism when we die to this world and are freed from the bondage of sin, and enjoy a new life in Christ as his disciples, in turn bringing his message of the resurrection to others. And then, when our bodies die He will call us forth from our dark tombs to enjoy everlasting life in His eternal light.

Recovering the Full Celebration of the Liturgy Participation

The Church earnestly desires that all the faithful be led to that full, conscious, and active participation in liturgical celebrations called for by the very nature of the liturgy. (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 14)

The outbreak of the Covid-19 Pandemic in 2020 required a temporary reduction of liturgical practices in the celebration of the Eucharist and administration of the sacraments. With almost all aspects of life returning to normalcy, it seems opportune for the Archdiocese of Newark to foster a renewed fullness in liturgical celebrations.

That all the baptized share in the one priesthood of Jesus Christ is the key to understanding the Church's call for full, conscious and active participation—thus transforming liturgical assemblies from passive congregations to dynamic worshippers.

Full participation means that every member of the community has a role in the liturgy; it does not mean that everyone does everything. Liturgy, like the Church, respects the different roles assigned by Christ; it allows all the different voices to blend in one great hymn of praise.

Active participation certainly means that, in gesture, word, song and service, all the members of the community take part in the act of worship, which is anything but inert or passive. Yet active participation does not preclude the active passivity of silence and listening; indeed, it demands it when listening to the readings or the homily or internalizing the prayers of the celebrant and the chants and music of the liturgy. These experiences are in their own way profoundly active.

Conscious participation calls for the entire community to be properly instructed in the mysteries of the liturgy. But it does not mean a constant attempt within the liturgy itself to make the implicit explicit, which may trivialize the act of worship. Nor does it mean the suppression of all subconscious experience, which is vital to liturgy which thrives on symbols.

Above all, the faithful form one body by the common offering of the Sacrifice and by participating together at the Lord's table. The role of the assembly cannot be underestimated, nor diminished. It is their right and duty by virtue of their Baptism.

HELP FOR OUR VETS

The Knights of Columbus Council 3240 together with The Church of the Assumption is repeating its annual drive for items needed for our Veterans who visit the Lyons or East Orange Facilities for Medical treatments. The Items listed below are **NOT** supplied by the US Government and donations like these are greatly appreciated. Last year our Church collected 19 boxes of needed supplies which lasted months, we hope to duplicate or surpass this amount again this year.

Both Hospitals have **SPECIFIC Guidelines** on what they can **Accept** and what is **NOT Acceptable**.

Acceptable Material Donations needed year-round:

Toiletries, body wash, deodorant, men razors, shaving cream, body lotions, shampoo.

Undergarments men and women- t-shirts, tank tops, socks, sport bras, undergarments, etc. All sizes from S – 4XL.

Season/Weather appropriate clothing for men and women to include pajamas, shirts, pants, shorts, sweatpants, sweatshirts, jackets, coats, hats, and gloves. All sizes S – 5XL.

Slipper socks for men and women. All sizes.

Shoes/sneakers (with and without velcro)- Men sizes 8 – 14, women sizes 7 – 12

Winter boots for men and women- Men sizes 8 – 14, women sizes 7 – 12

Coffee; Keurig K-Cup Coffee and Can Coffee

Snacks commercially and individually packaged; this can include puddings for Veterans who suffer from dysphagia.

**St. John of Egypt
March 27, Saint**



Saint John of Egypt (? - 394), also known as John the Hermit or John the Anchorite (Latin: Iohannes anchorita), was one of the hermits of the Nitrean desert. He began as a carpenter and left to solitude after receiving a divine call. According to hagiographer Alban Butler, John was noted for performing seemingly absurd acts at the bidding of the Holy Spirit, such as rolling rocks from place to place and cultivating dead trees. He then

withdrew to the top of a cliff, where he could avoid all human contact.

He avoided seeing women, in particular, to avoid temptation, but he avoided all people for the last fifty years of his life. Saint Augustine wrote that John was tempted by devils and performed miraculous cures. He cured a woman, according to Augustine, of blindness and then appeared to her in a vision to avoid seeing her in person. He possessed the spiritual gift of prophecy and spoke through a window to people twice a week, often predicting the future and knowing the details of persons he had never met. He predicted future victories to the Emperor Theodosius the Great.

According to Butler, John prayed incessantly, and he spent the last three days of his life without food or drink or any interactions but prayer. He was discovered in his cell, with his body in a position of prayer.

MAKE A SANDWICH FOR THE HUNGRY

Lenten sandwich making: looking for something different to do during lent? Why not try making sandwiches for those in need at St. Joseph's social service center in Elizabeth.

Here is how it works: every Thursday evening between 6:30 and 7:00 pm there is a volunteer at the annex (the two garages facing Coolidge Place) collecting sandwiches that will be delivered to St. Joseph's.

Guidelines for sandwiches:

- Meat (2 slices) and Cheese (1 slice), or
- Peanut Butter and Jelly
- No mayo, condiments, lettuce, or tomato, please
- Sandwiches must be individually wrapped in plastic sandwich bags (no aluminum foil) and inserted back in the bread bag.

One loaf of bread typically is enough for 10 sandwiches. You must mark the outside of the bread bag with the type of sandwich and the date that it was made. (example: PBJ 2/15 or ham & cheese 2/22)
