A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

Psalm, 118 "His mercy endures forever."

The mercy of the Lord truly endures forever. Mercy is a word that is so inclusive that there can be no limit to its broadness. And because of this it is a word synonymous with God himself. Even in our English language I can quickly find 18 synonyms which all speak of wideness of God's mercy.

One of the most interesting of synonyms that I discovered is humanity. If you think about it, to be truly human means to be merciful. You already know that when we see someone lacking in mercy we describe him as inhumane. But man on his own is very much not himself. Without faith, without the grace of God we fall terribly short of the mercy that is innate in us. Man has another aspect of mercy in him called freedom. What I mean is, we cannot be merciful if we are not free to choose mercy or not. And this free will we possess in the core of our humanity is from the Creator. We are created in his image and likeness and so we are free to be merciful, to be compassionate, to be forgiving. And we are called by our Creator to be like him. Christ himself is the perfect man for he was truly and fully human and because he was fully and truly one with the Creator. He is the Creator, in him exists all mercy, all gentleness, all understanding, for he is all in all. In him there is no inhumanity only pure humanity. And so he is full of mercy.

The merciful one is Jesus Christ who is true God and true man. He experienced our pain, our suffering, and our fallen state. And so he became one of us and in doing so, raised us up to his divinity so that we too might show mercy to our fellow human beings. He even gave us the power to forgive sins: to the priest the power to absolve the sinner of mortal sin, and to the believer the power to show charity even to his enemy. For unless we forgive and show mercy even to those who sin against us, then we cannot ask for God's mercy and forgiveness. My mother was fond of saying, Charity begins at home. As a child I saw that as something very narrow and confining but I have come to realize that unless we love the one we see, we cannot love the One we cannot see. St. Thomas would only believe if he saw, and the others did not believe the witnesses of the risen Christ until they saw him themselves. The Lord's mercy endures forever, and it lives in those who show mercy. As we celebrate the Divine Mercy, let us do it by showing mercy to those who have hurt us, pardon those who curse us, and pray for those who fail us, and then the mercy of God will be ours.

St. Anselm, April 21

Saint Anselm of Canterbury is the Father of Scholasticism and a Doctor of the Catholic Church. He was born in 1033 A.D. and died in 1109 A.D. In 1720, Pope Clement XI declared him a Doctor of the Church.

Below are 10 quotes demonstrating his great theological prowess.

1. "My soul, have you found what you are looking for? You were looking for God, and you have discovered that He is the supreme being, and that you could not possibly imagine anything more perfect. You have discovered that this supreme being is life itself, light, wisdom, goodness, eternal blessedness and blessed eternity."

2. "A single Mass offered for oneself during life may be worth more than a thousand celebrated for the same intention after death."

3. "Idleness is the enemy of the soul."

4. "I do not try, Lord, to attain Your lofty heights, because my understanding is in no way equal to it. But I do desire to understand Your truth a little, that truth that my heart believes and loves. I do not seek to understand that I may believe; but I believe so that I may understand. For I believe this also, that unless I believe, I shall not understand"

5. "It is impossible to save one's soul without devotion to Mary and without her protection."

6. "Souls well-beloved of my soul, my eyes ardently desire to behold you; my arms expand to embrace you; my lips sigh for your kisses; all the like that remains to me is consumed with waiting for you. How can I forget those whom I have placed like a seal upon my heart?"

7. "Come now, insignificant man, fly for a moment from your affairs, escape for a little while from the tumult of your thoughts. Put aside now your weighty cares and leave your wearisome toils. Abandon yourself for a little to God and rest for a little in Him."

8. "God does not delay to hear our prayers because He has no mind to give; but that, by enlarging our desires, He may give us the more largely."

9. "Come now, insignificant man, fly for a moment from your affairs, escape for a little while from the tumult of your thoughts. Put aside now your weighty cares and leave your wearisome toils. Abandon yourself for a little to God and rest for a little in Him."

10. "God was conceived of a most pure Virgin ... it was fitting that the virgin should be radiant with a purity so great that a greater purity cannot be conceived."

Divine Mercy Sunday

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

During the telecast of the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II, one of the commentators mentioned how the sunlight caught the diamonds encrusted on the Imperial State Crown that was set atop the coffin. She remarked that those jewels emitted a powerful blue light for a few seconds as the cortege passed by.

Recalling that comment, I find that momentary glance at a beam of sunlight reflected by diamonds on a crown is a perfect metaphor for God's nature. Like the facets of a diamond, His nature as Light of the World has so many beautiful consequences. Take, for example, God's goodness. What a comfort it is amid the success of so many evils in our world. The same for God's other qualities like His love, His justice, or His omnipotence,

Today the Church invites us to pay attention in a special way to God's mercy. It is that consoling quality of His that we sinners depend on for our hope and trust. Specifically, the Church designates this day as "Divine Mercy Sunday." The feast was so named such by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of the nun Sr. Faustina Kowalski. The new saint who had experienced a series of personal revelations from God.

The most comprehensive revelation can be found in Sister Faustina's diary, where Our Lord said, in part: "My daughter, tell the world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners."

The Easter Octave (8th Day) has always been centered on the theme of Divine Mercy and forgiveness. Jesus announces peace to His startled disciples. No upbraiding or scolding of them over their Good Friday desertion. He makes the case that behind the whole mystery of what He had suffered and His resurrection was all part of a plan for their redemption and ours as well.

God's mercy is just one facet of the great "diamond" which is His nature. But what a consolation that is to us when we have sinned! It is sad that so many of our fellow Catholics seem to absolve themselves these days so to speak. They are missing out on this sacramental channel of God's authentic mercy in the confessional and walking around with hurting souls and risking sacrilege by approaching the Eucharist in their condition.

In the 1930s, a correspondent for the "London Times," researching on many of the problems we now have, ended every article with this statement: "What's wrong with the world?" Gilbert Keith Chesterton, the great English writer, philosopher and Christian apologist, wrote a famous reply. "Dear editor: What's wrong with the world? I am. Faithfully yours, G.K. Chesterton." I freely admit that I would have to write the same response. What about you? "Kyrie eleison" (Lord, have mercy.)

**Saint Anselm, Archbishop of Canterbury
(1034-1109)**

Saint Anselm was a native of Piedmont. When as a boy of fifteen he was forbidden to enter religion after the death of his good Christian mother, for a time he lost the fervor she had imparted to him. He left home and went to study in various schools in France; at length his vocation revived, and he became a monk at Bec in Normandy, where he had been studying under the renowned Abbot Lanfranc.

The fame of his sanctity in this cloister led King William Rufus of England, when dangerously ill, to take him for his confessor and afterwards to name him to the vacant see of Canterbury to replace his own former master, Lanfranc, who had been appointed there before him. He was consecrated in December, 1093. Then began the strife which characterized Saint Anselm's episcopate. The king, when restored to health, lapsed into his former sins, continued to plunder the Church lands, scorned the archbishop's rebukes, and forbade him to go to Rome for the pallium.

Finally the king sent envoys to Rome for the pallium; a legate returned with them to England, bearing it. The Archbishop received the pallium not from the king's hand, as William would have required, but from that of the papal legate. For Saint Anselm's defense of the Pope's supremacy in a Council at Rockingham, called in March of 1095, the worldly prelates did not scruple to call him a traitor. The Saint rose, and with calm dignity exclaimed, If any man pretends that I violate my faith to my king because I will not reject the authority of the Holy See of Rome, let him stand, and in the name of God I will answer him as I ought. No one took up the challenge; and to the disappointment of the king, the barons sided with the Saint, for they respected his courage and saw that his cause was their own. During a time he spent in Rome and France, canons were passed in Rome against the practice of lay investiture, and a decree of excommunication was issued against offenders.

When William Rufus died, another strife began with William's successor, Henry I. This sovereign claimed the right of investing prelates with the ring and crozier, symbols of the spiritual jurisdiction which belongs to the Church alone. Rather than yield, the archbishop went into exile, until at last the king was obliged to submit to the aging but inflexible prelate.

In the midst of his harassing cares, Saint Anselm found time for writings which have made him celebrated as the father of scholastic theology, while in metaphysics and in science he had few equals. He is yet more famous for his devotion to our Blessed Mother, whose Feast of the Immaculate Conception he was the first to establish in the West. He died in 1109.
