

This Fifth Sunday of our Lenten journey brings us into PASSIONTIDE. The scripture readings and prayers focus on the coming days of the commemoration of the Lord's passion and death. These last two weeks of Lent afford us an opportunity to contemplate the reconciling mission of Jesus. "By His Cross and Resurrection, He has set us free"; free from the burden of our sins which brings death, and the joy of experiencing the love of God through forgiveness and the promise of life after death. We grow too accustomed to the cross and images of Saints as if they were mere decorations. For this reason, the dramatic covering of the cross and images gives us a reason to stop and reflect.

The purpose of covering the cross is to emphasize it being revealed on Good Friday. The purpose of covering other images is to take the focus off the images and focus our attention on the central mysteries of our faith; the death and resurrection of Jesus. The veiling of the cross and images is a type of "fasting" from sacred depictions which represent the Paschal glory of our salvation. Just as the Lenten fast concludes with the Paschal feast, so too, our fasting from the cross culminates in an adoration of the Holy Wood on which the sacrifice of Calvary was offered for our sins. Likewise, a fasting from the glorious images of the mysteries of faith and the saints in glory, culminates on the Easter night with a renewed appreciation of the glorious victory won by Christ, risen from the tomb to win for us eternal life.

As we approach these most solemn days, let us also approach the Sacrament which restores our focus to higher things and a life set free from sin and death. Confessions will be heard throughout the day next Saturday, April 9 beginning at 1:00 P.M. until 5:30pm. Guest priests will be here to give you the opportunity to confess to a priest other than myself. If it has been a year or more since your last confession, be humble before God and hear the comforting words of absolution; YOU ARE FORGIVEN!

As part of the Day of Reconciliation, there will be a HEALING MASS on Saturday, April 9 at 12 noon. The Sacrament of Anointing will be offered during the Mass. Let the Sacrament of Anointing bring the grace of inner healing to any who suffer in mind, body, or spirit.

Come let the healing power of Jesus through the Sacraments of the Church touch your hearts and souls to the depth that you may experience the true joy of Easter!



The Paschal Fast and Precept: The days of FAST and ABSTINENCE during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence. On a Fast Day, only one (1) full meal is permitted, and two (2) smaller meals which added together would not exceed the full meal. Those between 18 and 59 years are obligated to fast. On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who reached the age of 14 are obligated to abstain from meat on days appointed. The time to fulfill the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty) extends from the First Sunday of Lent (March 6, 2022) to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity (June 12, 2022). The faithful are bound to receive Holy Communion at least once a year during the time of the Paschal Precept. The Sacrament of Confession prepares for a worthy observance of the Paschal Precept.



SAINT VINCENT FERRER

PRAY FOR US



St. Vincent Ferrer (1350-1419) was born in Valentia, Spain, the son of a knight. From his parents he learned virtue and generosity to the poor. As a child he fasted every Wednesday and Friday and was tenderly devoted to the Passion of Christ and the Blessed Mother. He excelled in his studies and joined the Dominican Order with the support of his parents. He flourished in both austerity and scholarship, and became famous for performing more miracles than any other saint. His miracle-working powers began in the womb with the healing of a blind woman who touched his mother's pregnant belly. He began a preaching career across Europe that continued for twenty years. He was followed by a train of priests, nuns, penitents, and pilgrims that numbered in the thousands. When he arrived in a village his retinue would set up camp, and St. Vincent would preach to great crowds on the subjects of sin, death, heaven, and hell. He would also celebrate Mass and hear confessions daily. He slept on the floor and maintained a perpetual fast. Twice a day the "Bell of Miracles" was rung when all the sick and infirm were brought to him for cures; it was not unusual for him to perform one hundred miracles in a day. He also made scores of converts among the Muslims and Jews. St. Vincent believed that he was a special messenger of penance sent by God to prepare men for the final judgment; at that time the Black Death was ravaging across Europe killing millions, and the Great Schism was rending the Church in two. Through him multitudes were brought to penance & conversion. St. Vincent Ferrer's feast day is April 5th.

SAINT JOHN BAPTIST DE LA SALLE

PRAY FOR US



St. John Baptist de la Salle (1651-1719) was born in Rheims, France, to a noble family. He was pious and smart, and his parents took great care over his moral and intellectual training. He entered seminary and was ordained at the age of twenty-seven. In St. John Baptist's era, only the noble and wealthy classes had access to a good education. His work among the poor led him to establish a home and school for rough and illiterate orphaned boys. The institution was successful and soon a second was established. St. John Baptist then dedicated his life to the cause of education, giving his wealth to the poor and resigning his respectable position as canon at Rheims. He recruited and trained men to teach in free schools he founded for the poor, which grew into a brotherhood of young men who were attracted to a life of service in teaching and catechesis. This became the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, or Christian Brothers. They took vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, but not Holy Orders. The Christian Brothers expanded, and in many parts of France parish priests sent young men to be trained by St. John Baptist to serve as schoolmasters in their villages. Although he was initially opposed in his innovative work, both inside and outside the Church, St. John Baptist's foundations and methods soon became the standard for education in France and spread internationally. St. John Baptist de la Salle is the patron of schoolteachers. His feast day is April 7th.
