“You will hear of wars and reports of wars; see that you are not alarmed, for these things must happen, but it will not yet be the end” (Matthew 24:6).

We seem to be living in a world today obsessed by wars. Ukraine-Russia, ISIS in northern Iraq and Syria, fighting between Israelis and Palestinians, civil unrest in Venezuela and Nicaragua, gangsters in Haiti and Mexico, Boko Haram in west Africa, and here in America a sharp divide between the left and the right. Is this the end times Jesus warned about?

When the Germanic barbarians began their massive invasion of the Roman Empire, many believed it was the end time. St. Augustine, as he lay on his death bed, believed the invasion of the barbarians was the end. It was the end of civilization as he knew it, but time marched on and the Church endured for Jesus promised that the gates of hell would never prevail against her.

With China threatening Taiwan, Russia invading the Ukraine, and terrorists around the world spreading death and fear, and the social and political upheaval right in our own beloved nation, we could start believing that the end time is upon us. Will we inflict such pain upon one another, that we fall into despair? or Is Christ coming soon to judge us? I cannot answer these questions, but I can firmly say, “The Church will endure even though empires fall, and I ask myself this question, ‘More importantly, are we prepared to meet Jesus?’”

Do not be afraid are the words of the angel to Mary. She trusted in the Lord and was given the privilege of bearing the Christ. We too must trust in Jesus, for when we die, which is more likely to occur before he returns in final judgment, we will have to ac-

count for our deeds, good and bad. And as is said at every burial of our mortal remains, “do not count our deeds against us, for in our heart we desired to do your will. As our faith united us to your people on earth, so may your mercy join us to the angels in heaven.” War and reports of wars are inevitable, but our end comes only when we meet Christ face to face. If we were faithful, he will be judge us favorably, but if we have denied him through our persistent sinful acts and failure to repent, then the end is certainly near for us. Trust in Jesus.

PSE&G Assistance Available

If you are struggling to pay your energy bills, help is available. The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Universal Service Fund (USF) have expanded to include more people at higher income levels. For example, a family of four with a monthly income of \$9,250 may be eligible and should apply for USF. (Only the last month of income counts.) If you are not eligible for LIHEAP or USF, there are moderate-income programs, such as the PAGE Grant and/or NJ SHARES, which may provide the help you need. The orderly way we proceed through the liturgical year reminds us that our faith offers a strategic goal for our lives: eternal happiness with God, who is love. Today's readings share stories of believers who order their daily activities toward the goal of sharing God's love. Isaiah embraces his role as God's servant and works to bring glory not only to Israel, but to the entire world. In a similar way, Saint Paul identifies himself as Christ's witness in the world and reminds the Corinthians of their life goal: "to be holy." The Gospel shows us John the Baptist, servant and witness, attentive to God's loving orders, the divine plan for salvation.

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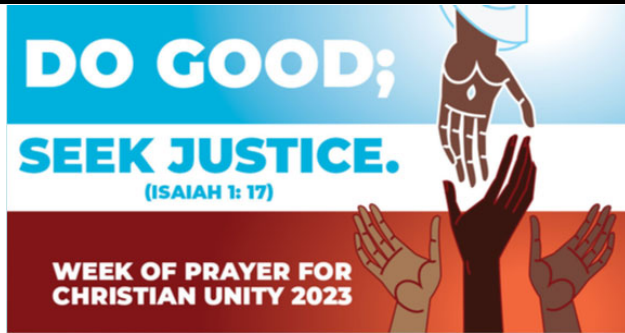

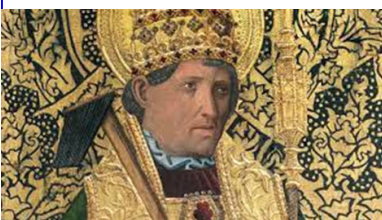


At least once a year, Christians are reminded of Jesus' prayer for his disciples that "they may be one so that the world may believe" (see John 17.21). Hearts are touched and Christians come together to pray for their unity.

Congregations and parishes all over the world exchange preachers or arrange special ecumenical celebrations and prayer services. The event that touches off this special experience is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

The theme for 2023 is "Do Good; Seek Justice" and comes from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, 1:17. It is promoted by a joint commission of the World Council of Churches and the Holy See's Dicastery for the Promotion of Christian Unity. It comes from the Minnesota Council of Churches as its offering to the world prayer movement in response to the injustice experienced by people of color in the United States and the whole world, demonstrated by the murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer in 2020.

As Christians seek unity among themselves through the observance of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, may God also offer healing to the whole human race.



Saint Fabian

Fabian was a Roman layman who came into the city from his farm one day as clergy and people were preparing to elect a new pope.

Eusebius, a Church historian, says a dove flew in and settled on the head of Fabian. This sign united the votes of clergy and laity, and he was chosen unanimously.

He led the Church for 14 years and died a martyr's death during the persecution of Decius in 250 A.D. Saint Cyprian wrote to his successor that Fabian was an "incomparable" man whose glory in death matched the holiness and purity of his life.

In the catacombs of Saint Callistus, the stone that covered Fabian's grave may still be seen, broken into four pieces, bearing the Greek words, "Fabian, bishop, martyr." St. Fabian shares the celebration of his liturgical feast with St. Sebastian on January 20.



Saint Sebastian

Almost nothing is historically certain about Sebastian except that he was a Roman martyr, was venerated in Milan in the time of Saint Ambrose and was buried on the Appian Way, probably near the present Basilica of St. Sebastian. Devotion to him spread rapidly, and he is mentioned in several martyrologies as early as 350.

The legend of Saint Sebastian is important in art, and there is a vast iconography. Scholars now agree that a pious fable has Sebastian entering the Roman army because only there could he assist the martyrs without arousing suspicion. Finally he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. His body was pierced with arrows, and he was left for dead. But he was found still alive by those who came to bury him. He recovered, but refused to flee.

One day he took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He accosted the emperor, denouncing him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. He was buried on the Appian Way, close to the catacombs that bear his name.

Reflection

The fact that many of the early saints made such a tremendous impression on the Church—awakening widespread devotion and great praise from the greatest writers of the Church—is proof of the heroism of their lives. As has been said, legends may not be literally true. Yet they may express the very substance of the faith and courage evident in the lives of these heroes and heroines of Christ.
